## Special Factors Aid Current Upturn

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THE CONTRAST between business activity in the Washington area this spring and a year ago is striking. About 16,000 more persons are employed. Payrolls are running 5 or 6 per cent higher; the influx of visitors

has been much greater, and retail sales, in the aggregate, have been 8 or 10 per

cent higher.

This upturn, though it coincides in timing and amplitude with that of the country as a whole, should not be attributed solely—perhaps not even mainly—to the national business recovery. Contract awards for public construction in the first quarter of this year were 36 per cent higher than in the first quarter of last year. The number

of Government employes in the Washing-



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ton area is about 6000 greater than a year ago, and Government payrolls are greater also because of higher pay scales.

Several other observations may be noted:

- The very marked increase in business activity in the past year has occurred without any increase in the aggregate employment of persons in retail stores, banks, insurance and real estate offices, railroad terminals and public utilities. But there has been some increase in the number
- Over 70 per cent of the gain in employment is accounted for but the gain in construction activity, and expansion of
- for by the rise in construction activity and expansion of Government agencies. The remaining increase is made up of small gains in the manufacturing and service industries.

 About half of the \$115 million of building authorized in the first quarter, in the Washington area, was for public projects.

• Housing starts in March were unusually high. Last fall, it was feared that the rise in interest rates would bring about a decline in housing starts by early spring. This fear has not been realized. The amount of residential construction in Fairfax County is especially noteworthy.

• The number of out-of-town visitors has been remarkable. Passenger arrivals and departures at the National Airport were 20 per cent greater in March of this year than in March, 1958. Twice as many visitors to the Smithsonian were tallied.

• New-car sales have continued to gain over last year and are running one third higher . . . The gain is more nearly 100 per cent in the case of foreign cars, which now account for about one sixth of new-car registrations in this area.
